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Dr. Lewis is a recognized specialist in international affairs, government affairs and terrorism. He has over 29 years of government service with the U.S. Air Force and U.S. Army and over nine years as a director of university research and educational institutes dealing with information assurance, homeland security, international affairs and conflict resolution. Dr. Lewis is instrumental in supporting the firm's efforts in meeting client's security and government relations needs through his knowledge of government processes, high tech applications, education/training and security awareness.

With a military background in the Army Corps of Engineers and as an Army Foreign Area Officer, Dr. Lewis brings an extensive background with command, staff officer/planner, and international negotiations experience to the TS2Corp team. As the Chief of Host Nation Support for USAEUR from 1993 to retirement in 1996, he was a principal negotiator in the European area of operations. This entailed working with allies on security and military-to-military issues and providing direct support to the commanding general on affairs dealing with NATO allies and Partnership for Peace nations. From 1991 to 1993, he was the Professor of Military Science at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, providing leadership for three full-time college/university programs. As the overseas director for the Defense Institute of Security Assistance Management at Wright Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, from 1988 to 1991,

Dr. Lewis was responsible for training civilians and military being assigned to embassies world-wide in technology transfer procedures, defense cooperation, FAR, Arms Export Control Act and regional studies. In addition, he developed and implemented a personal security awareness program for personnel and their dependents going abroad. During his tenure at Wright Patterson AFB, Dr. Lewis was selected for a Washington D.C. commission dealing with technology transfer policy issues at the national level and was appointed a member of a special committee within the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to develop assistance programs in Latin America. He completed the Special Forces personal security awareness course at Fort Bragg, NC and the Federal Acquisition Course at Fort Belvoir, VA.

As an academician, he holds a Ph.D. in History and International Relations from the University of Idaho (UI) and has published two books on right-wing extremism and terrorism, as well as numerous articles on terrorism, government relations, intelligence and technology transfer issues in journals. He also provided a number of guest lectures for DOD organizations, other academic institutions, and community forums. Dr. Lewis has been a consultant for media groups and for private industry. He regularly appears on radio and television as an expert in terrorism and homeland security. From 1997 to 2005 Dr. Lewis was the Director of the Martin Institute for Peace Studies and Conflict Resolution and the Martin School of International Affairs at the University of Idaho. In this capacity he administered all institute activities in research, outreach, teaching and conflict resolution. From 2002 to 2005, he was also the Director of the National Alliance for Information Assurance, which is made up of five NSA Centers of Excellence from across the United States. He provided the leadership and coordination for a consortium of universities committed to cooperation in information assurance efforts for the National Security Agency (NSA). During this same period he was selected to direct the UI Initiative for Research in Infrastructure Security, with the responsibility for coordinating all UI efforts in research for homeland security applications. He acted as the university liaison with government agencies and congressional delegations at both the federal and state level. In addition, he developed the strategic plan and time-line for research efforts in support of homeland security initiatives, provided direction and coordination for interdisciplinary proposals totaling over \$15 million and was instrumental in obtaining over \$3.2 million for UI research efforts as the primary coordinator with the federal and state agencies. Dr. Lewis provides a unique blend of government, private sector, and academic experience in support of the TS2 mission.

Dr. Lewis also is a certified General Real Estate Appraiser licensed in Idaho, Washington, Arizona and Pennsylvania. He has over 38 years of real property valuation experience and has done numerous commercial, residential, right-of-way, litigation and rural property appraisals.
